# 3.3 WOMEN EMPOWERMENT: MAHILA PANCHAYAT PROJECT



Delhi Commission for Women has promoted the setting up of Mahila Panchayats. Mahila Panchayat is an innovative and collective approach for community participation in dispute redressing. These Mahila Panchayats offer crisis intervention and legal aid at community level and help to tackle local level legal disputes and assist in reduction and reconciliation of violence against women.

The Sadik Masih Medical Social Servant Society is empaneled with DCW for the project and the working at Trilokpuri, Delhi. SMMSSS have started taking cases and resolving them at the community level. These cases pertain to bigamy, maintenance, domestic violence, alcoholism and other issues. In most cases Panchayats have been able to resolve the cases at their own level. In some cases, they had to take joint action to bring pressure on the men concerned so as to obtain redressing for the women complainants.

# 3.4. DIRECTLY OBSERVED TREATMENT SHORT COURSE (DOTS)

#### National Strategic Plan for Tuberculosis Elimination 2017-2025'

Revised National TB Control Programme (RNTCP) has released a 'National strategic plan for tuberculosis 2017-2025' (NSP) for the control and elimination of TB in India by 2025. According to the NSP TB elimination has been integrated into the four strategic pillars of "Detect – Treat – Prevent – Build" (DTPB).

In the association with RNTCP, Sadik Masih Medical Social Servant Society has initiated this program in 2004 and continuing till now. Over the years we have cured patients and completed the treatment of more than 110 patients in last financial year.

## 3.5. SHGS (SELF HELP GROUPS)

A self-help group (SHG) is a financial intermediary committee usually composed of 10 to 20 local women or men between 18 to 40 years. Most self-help groups are in India, though SHGs can be found in other countries, especially in South Asia and Southeast Asia. SHG is nothing but a group of people who are on daily wages, they form a group and from that group one person collects the money and gives the money to the person who is in need.

Members also make small regular savings contributions over a few months until there is enough money in the group to begin lending. Funds may then be lent back to the membersor to others in the village for any purpose. In India, many SHGs are 'linked' to banks for the delivery of micro-credit.
